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

Austria Country Profile



Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)

The WG on Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) develops measurable indicators to make the success of EOSC visible at international/European level along the overarching goals for Austria (“readiness indicators”)

KPIs are a steering instrument for targeted impact-oriented further development of Open Science in Austria and EOSC-compliant implementation

On May 10th, EOSC Austria Member **NHM (Natural History Museum)** hosted a workshop on the organisation's KPIs, making the first successes of EOSC implementation visible.

This second workshop of the Working Group KPIs illustrated the importance of the EOSC building process. Thirty-five experts from various stakeholder groups discussed national policies and strategies, identifying challenges or existing gaps and figuring out relevant monitoring and evaluation indicators.




KPI Model

- Input: KPIs according to SRIA, EOSC Observatory
- Stakeholder mapping, identify national strategies, policies & data sources
- KPI model
 - align with different policies, stakeholders and levels
 - define **objectives**, indicators, methods and responsibilities
 - adap the PEST scheme



Focus on “impact”

- Inputs: Resources, time, committed efforts
- Outputs: What is counted, what is produced
- Outcomes: What do we want to achieve
- Impact: What effect took place (directly or indirectly)



Monitoring: What has been invested, done and produced, and how are we supporting partners to achieve the objectives?

Evaluation and review: What progress has the project made towards achieving its objectives?

Impact assessment: What long-term, sustainable changes have occurred and how did our interventions contribute to these?
